## <u>Director – Shona McCullagh</u>

#### **Director's Notes**

The film originated with the choreographic idea of a suspension of the natural laws of gravity. It occurred to me that yearning was the emotional equivalent of a suspension of a body in time and space. Devising a story where a character yearned to leave but was compelled to stay provided the emotional and movement tension I needed to explore this idea.

All of my films have begun in a similar way, a simple movement idea teased out to reveal characters and a problem that must be resolved. Again I wanted the movement alone to tell the story and in this film I have enjoyed the innocence a child's body reveals, even in stillness and his placement in relation to adults.

The child in one scene "plaits" his playful movement amidst the ghastly argument of the parents – I was interested in the different physical levels we live in.

The film's ideas and rigging techniques were developed over a long period of time with the dancers and rigger Scottie Anderson.

#### **Director's Bio**

Dip.Dance ;MNOZM; NZ Arts Foundation Laureate

Shona holds a unique position in New Zealand as an outstanding film director, dancer/ choreographer, filmmaker and educator.

Shona's first two films have achieved international recognition and unprecedented sales for NZ work featuring dance as a narrative medium. Her first film, Hurtle, won several international awards, including the Paula Citron Award for Choreography for Camera at the Moving Pictures Festival in Toronto and screened at Sundance in 2000. Her second film, fly, won the Australasian 2002 Reeldance Awards and was selected to screen on the BBC's Shortest Night Short Film Festival and was in the Official Selection at Clermont-Ferrand in 2003.

In 2002 Shona was named a New Zealand Arts Foundation Arts Laureate and in 2003 she was awarded Creative New Zealand's inaugural Senior Choreographic Fellowship.

Shona researched the software Isadora as her fellowship activity and developed a series of installations for dancers and non-dancers utilising the performance interactive software. In 2004 Shona created choreography for three feature films, Perfect Creature, The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe and King Kong. She also created a work on the Royal New Zealand Ballet company for their initial 2005 season. Shona has recently completed her 3rd dance film titled break which was the only New Zealand film to be accepted for competition at the prestigious Clermont-Ferrand Film Festival in France.

She recently co-directed Nutcracker for television and is currently preparing a work for the New Zealand School of Dance, developing interactive installations and a feature film script.
