STORY OF THE FILM

Fresh Meat is a unique blend of comedy horror and action.

Director Danny Mulheron: "To be honest it's not often as a director you get to have car crashes, shoot outs, lesbian shower scenes, cannibalism, comedy, horror and thrills, all in one movie. It's a real privilege to make a film I would enjoy watching and I hope people will come away having had a lot of laughs, a few frights and a nice date!"

Dave Gibson originally came across the story with a Canadian producer Derek Diorio (Fresh Meat Executive Producer). "I was keen to do another horror film but had struggled to find New Zealand writers who loved the genre as much as I do. Derek came to me with the script about a white middle class family (of cannibals) whose home was invaded by a gang

of criminals. It was set somewhere in the middle of Canada and I became fixated by the idea of changing it."

Dave then had to find a writer willing to accept his twisted take on the story. Fortunately celebrated Maori scriptwriter Briar Grace-Smith was up for the task (albeit with some initial hesitations). Dave explains, "I had worked with Briar before and I knew she had an interesting dark side to her. I also knew she liked watching horror films and she completely embraced the challenge. There was only one thing we had to help her with and that was around coming up with new and interesting ways to kill people. That was the only slight gap in her knowledge."

For Dave there was no other choice for the director role. "Danny has served an enormous apprenticeship in terms of working with actors and comedy and this is a comedy horror. It's right up his alley. I didn't want it to be some sort of mutilating dead bodies slasher pic. Danny was perfect as he's got a lighter touch and he can find the humour, even within the gore."

But who would play Dr Hemi Crane? None other than veteran actor Temuera Morrison, It was a case of "love at first sight" when Tem met Danny and from there everything fell into place. "We actors are quite vulnerable," Morrison explains. "We're trying to contend with the dialogue, the movements and everything needs sculpting and shaping so it was really fortunate Danny and I just gelled. We have a good basic respect for each other and we have that communication. He guided us through the journey and it's all about being on the same waka (canoe), paddling together."

The action is largely set in the Crane's middle-class McMansion in suburban

Churton Park. The beige exterior hides a blood-thirsty interior with a paedophile in the boot of the Corolla, a vegetarian in the oven and a bloody areat abattoir in the basement.

The full house set was constructed by production designer Kevin Leonard-Jones and his art department team in the facilities at Avalon Studios in Lower Hutt, Wellington.

The magazine style interiors, the colour schemes and the furniture were selected to create the vision of a house worthy of the new Urban Maori. The Crane family appear to have it all; middle class yet upwardly mobile, their grey and white interior perfect to offset the deep red of splattered blood.

Dave Gibson, Producer:

I came across the story when I was on the hunt for a horror film and it was set somewhere in the middle of Canada. When I read it I was attracted to the terrific amount of energy and the events that just keep compounding. I love the set up of the home invasion and the fact it goes so horribly wrong. The cannibals turn the tables, so to speak, on the gang.

Originally it was all white people running around eating each other and I can't remember how it came about but I know I was the idiat who had

the idea of moving the story to New Zealand and making the family contemporary Maori cannibals. I tried the idea on a few people and they were stunned and I really liked that.

I am attracted to working on genre films. When you're playing with a genre you're allowed to have some fun and do silly things. You can do gore, splatter and lesbian shower scenes as the audience knows what they're in for and they ao for it

LEAD ACTOR - KATE ELLIOTT

What was it that attracted you about playing Giai?

Gigi's a great role. She has vulnerability and strength and her story has a great arc. I also really wanted to work with Temuera Morrison and to do my own stunts so it ticked all the boxes.

How did you find your character?

I did a lot of investigating on YouTube about girls firing shotguns and ended up sending videos back and forth to Danny of these weird hick American women firing shotguns in slow motion. I've always played strong females but I've never played anyone really good at using her fists and a shotgun.

Director Danny Mulheron:

She was so committed to it after some initial worries. Once she got a shotgun in her hand she realised the thrill of shooting things up and running and punching people. She was asking me, "What is this?" "Am I being made fun of?", "Am I being exploited?" "Yes, yes and yes' I'd respond. But she really got into it and she's a hero. I would say to her, "You're Clint Eastwood in hot pants in this movie."

LEAD ACTOR -TEMUERA MORRISON

You came on board Fresh Meat from very early on, what was it that attracted you about the script?

The big thing for me is that I have always been looking for a comedy genre film. For most of my career I've been ploying these tough roles in Once Were Warriors, Crooked Earth and I had my eye on what scriptwriter Briar Grace-Smith was up to . I had seen a lot of this new Maori breed of writers coming through so I'd been on the look out to work with her. Normally she's right into the Maori elements, creating quite spiritual, moving works oi it's something fresh for her as well as me.

How did you find your character?

He's a bit of a mad professor really, There's a word in Maori 'whaka hihi' that means a little bit 'stuck up' and he's a bit like that. Hemi thinks very highly of himself and he is very educated of course. He's just rather partial to human flesh, as a viable sustainable lifestyle. He's just totally mad I think.

Briar Grace-Smith:

I was able to channel my inner teenage boy. I have a teenage son and I quite often used him in terms of humour and character to check if he would laugh at certain things. Most of the language is from being around my kids, my friends and my own family. As writers we tend to listen closely to how people speak.

It was fun embracing but also refining

the other stereotypes of Maori characters I have seen. So in Fresh Meat we have a middle class Maori family we don't usually see on screen in New Zealand. We have Hemi Crane, an associate professor and Margaret Crane, the celebrity chef so they were a fun family to deal with the cannibalism issue through.

I have treated cannibalism as something quite normal which is what

this family does. It's cheeky, It's about owning our past and recreating our future, rather than pretending it didn't happen. I also had a lot of fun thinking about recipes you could possibly use human flesh with. Apparently pork tastes pretty close so there is a recipe in there for mini pork and rosemary pies that people can order on the internet for dinner parties.
