When it's your fourteenth birthday and nobody seems to notice, sometimes it's the little things that really matter the most.

# LONG SYNOPSIS

When George Apirana arrives home to her state house apartment block on her fourteenth birthday looking forward to having a dinner date with her mother, she ends up getting rejected in favour of her mother's new male companion.

Unwittingly thrown into the night with no money and no particular place to be. Tama, her six-year-old neighbour tries to muscle in on her journey only to be rejected outright and told pragmatically "that life sucks and he should get used to it".

George travels into the city & using her street-smart instincts tries in vain to create her own fun before resigning to the fact that sometimes life really does sucks and she is forced to take heed of her own advice.

Humbled by this realisation and lonely, she invites Tama over to her empty home to eat some cake that her mother left out for her before she took off. After a proud pause, Tama reluctantly joins her - toasting her birthday with a generous bourbon and coke that she sneakily serves him.

Wise beyond his years and overwhelmingly aware of George's sadness, Tama will do anything to cheer her up, so he presents her with a home-made tennis ball creation he has spent all evening trying to master. Stunned by his generosity and kindness George lets her guard down for a fraction of a moment and allows this gesture of pure unabashed love to touch her.

## DIRECTOR'S NOTES

"The stronger the wind, the stronger the trees"

When I began writing the little things I knew from the outset that I wanted it to be a story that whispered and didn't yell, I also knew that in order for it to work it had to be observational in style and it had to be honest. One of my primary objectives for the film was to make the audience a pro-active part of the narrative process rather than have them passively watch events unfolding. To achieve this, I wanted to frame the narrative with a universal experience, one that wasn't racially, culturally, nor gender specific, but that captured a time that everyone could relate to, irrespective of circumstance. So I chose that moment in a young person's life when they've outgrown thinking about the world as a child but don't quite fit the mindset of an adult yet. Overall my intention was to create a narrative that raised more questions than it answered, to create a space for the audience to think about what is happening to the characters on screen rather than being told how to feel about them and to that end, I feel as though I achieved my goal.

Internationally acclaimed New Zealand casting director Diana Rowan, helped me cast a fine balance of professional and non-professional actors for the movie. Fourteen-year-old high school student Norissa Taia made her debut film appearance playing George with acute stillness & subtlety to powerful affect. Similarly, six-year-old Romain Waerea lent a natural innocence and optimism to the movie with his moving performance as Tama. The cast along with a minimal crew travelled 250 kilometres north of Auckland to the strange and beautiful city of Whangarei whose curious fusion of urban, rural & suburban landscapes seemed to heighten George's sense of dislocation.

As the product of solo parenting myself, I wrote this movie to highlight the unexpected ways in which generosity & love can sometimes come to us in the wake of difficult circumstances. It has been my experience that when you least expect it, from the last person you might imagine, sometimes-extraordinary things happen. For me what happens to George simply is what it is, sometimes life can be a bit hard but I believe there is beauty in the strength we get by negotiating the adversity that gets thrown in our paths and that's why Tama's character really shines. For me, he represents love; the sort of love George needs and wants, the sort of love she wishes her mother had shown her and the sort of love that she's frightened to accept in the wake of the evening's constant series of disappointments. To her credit she does accept it though, even if she knows all too well that it's temporal. There is definitely strength in their unification and therein lies my own message of hope.

The little things was funded by the New Zealand Film Commission and was submitted as my thesis project for my Master of Fine Arts degree at New York University's, Tisch School of the Arts. It is my second short film, the first I have shot in my home country of New Zealand. As an emerging director, I am grateful to the cast and crew for their generosity and support, in particular my producer Catherine Fitzgerald who has been attached to this project since its conception.

#### DIRECTOR'S BIOGRAPHY

REINA WEBSTER is of Maori descent and has tribal affiliations with Ngai Tuhoe, Ngati Tuwharetoa & Nga Puhi. She began her career as a photographic assistant before moving into the fields of Broadcasting, Television Presenting, Publicity, Producing & Directing. She has a Bachelor of Arts Degree in English & Film Theory from Auckland University. In the New Year she will become the first New Zealander to graduate with a Master of Fine Arts Degree in Film Directing from New York University's prestigious Graduate Film Program.

Reina has been the recipient of many awards including: a Graduate Fulbright Scholarship, the New Zealand Film Commission's Matiu Mareikura Film Maker Award, an AMP Premiere Young Achiever's Scholarship, a Sara Driver post-production grant and was recently awarded a grant from Warner Brother's to complete her short film "the little things".

Upon returning to New Zealand to live, she has been employed full time as a Television Producer on a two-hour, weekly, live, music program, completed a trainee directing block in television drama at South Pacific Pictures and more recently has producing and directed three behind the scenes documentaries for Sione's Wedding, Maddigan's Quest & Outrageous Fortune, respectively. Reina is currently residing in South Auckland, New Zealand, writing her debut feature length film script, completing her Master of Arts thesis at Auckland University, and is kept busy with her one year-old daughter, Maioro Moteatea Iti.
